Over the years we have had trouble with the very slow filling of the cistern in the men's toilet through being connected to a gravity tank in the roof and over the years attempts have been made to rectify things — short of re-plumbing the place.

Things became annoying earlier this year so it was decided that we should take the bull by the horns and connect things to the pressure line, and that wasn't as easy as it sounds. So by the time you read this everything should be right.

The work gang have also reconstructed the trap points to the west of the main steam-up bay. The original which was installed last year was not a great success in that if a loco ran away and hit the huge chunk of steel that was in place, there would be more damage to the engine than if it had fallen down the adjacent bank.

It was decided that trap-points should be installed instead to end up in a pile of gravel which in theory would be softer than steel.

[As an aside: This is similar to what most New Zealand tramways had at the end of the line at a terminus that might have been on a slight slope where a hole was dug and filled with softer material and sealed over to allow motor vehicles to cross safely. This was known as a tram-trap].

Here's hoping that it never has to be used.





The points mechanism is of the spring-back type which is set for the gravel heap. If you want to go straight ahead a pin has to be pulled to disengage the spring and allow a train to proceed on to the main line. TO BE AN EXCITING NEW TOURIST ATTRACTION FOR WHANGARE!!


